Children's book helps Gophers get going again

Fleck conveys inspiring theme to help team grow.

The Gophers were abysmal the first two football games of the season.

And only coach P.J. Fleck could find the teachable moment in that unsavory set of performances.

"I read them a book, 'Everyone Poops,'" Fleck recalled of the Friday team meeting before the Illinois game. "And I know that sounds crazy because we didn't play very well, but poop can be used as fertilizer if you grow. And in Minnesota, we've got lots of farms, and the poop is actually the manure, and it can help with crops and the best fruit and vegetables."

The children's book, which depicts various animals relieving themselves, is meant to show kids how going No. 2 is normal and nothing to be embarrassed about, especially since everyone does it. And that's essentially what Fleck was metaphorically trying to convey as well.

The Gophers did really crumble to start the season, losing big to Michigan and at Maryland with a highly touted passing game failing to meet expectations and a defense allowing an average of 578 yards per game. Running back Mohamed Ibrahim was one of the few not wasting his chances.

At Illinois on Saturday,

though, the Gophers' 41-14 victory did seem to sprout from their earlier failures, seizing an opportunity against a struggling opponent. Ibrahim rushed for another 224 yards. Quarterback Tanner Morgan and receiver Rashod Bateman connected for their first touchdown. The defense held the Illini to 287 yards. Even the shaken special teams unit went from glaringly bad to not really noticeable.

And maybe that's because the coach reminded his players that good can come from bad.

"I mean, that's Coach Fleck. It hit perfect of being able to grow," Morgan said of the book's lessons. "... I think our guys really took to it."

This isn't the first time Fleck — a former schoolteacher, as he likes to remind people — has tucked his players in with a bedtime story. Earlier this year, he discussed "Goldilocks and the Three Bears" with the team as a strategy for how to navigate an unknown COVID-19-impacted season "just right."

Fleck said he tried not to mention the team's winless

record to his players throughout the week, instead trying to turn their focus to something they could control. He re-educated them on the foundation of his "Row the Boat" culture, how the ultimate goal is to all keep moving toward the common goal together, no matter the obstacles.

Returning to the basics seemed to help settle the Gophers at Illinois. And they'll hope the quick turnaround for a Friday game against Iowa won't be too much of a strain.

"It's a huge rivalry game for us," Fleck said. "I think everybody in the state of Iowa and the state of Minnesota knows how important this game is, 2020 or not. It's a really big game. It's a really important game."

The Gophers' 23-19 loss in Iowa City last season ruined a perfect record and extended a border-game losing streak to five. This year, Iowa is also 1-2, having struggled in its first two games before finally rebounding big Saturday to crush Michigan State 49-7.

It's unknown what tale Fleck might bust out come Thursday night to inspire his players — though "The Three Little Pigs," in honor of Floyd of Rosedale, is probably a good bet.

"It's not just a children's book, you know, those children's books have a message," Bateman said of Fleck's choice in literature. "And everybody thinks that they're just for young kids, but it doesn't matter your age. Of all ages, you read that book, and there's a message in there for everybody."

And Coach Fleck does a good job of pulling that message out of the book and spreading it to our team and to apply it on the field and in our lives."

GOPHERS REPLAY GOPHERS 41, ILLINOIS 14

Offense opens up, defense tightens up

THE RECAP

The Gophers needed a turnaround to their 0-2 start, and they made the U-ie at Illinois on Saturday.

Mohamed Ibrahim led the rush in another dominant game, running for 224 yards on 30 carries. He scored four touchdowns and eclipsed 200 rushing yards in back-to-back games, only the second Gophers player to run for that much yardage in consecutive games.

But different from the losses against Michigan and at Maryland, the passing game also contributed to the team's success. Quarterback Tanner Morgan went 17-for-27 for 216 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Receiver Rashod Bateman caught the score as part of his 139 yards on 10 catches.


The defense, which had averaged allowing opponents 578 offensive yards per game, tightened up to allow the Illini only 287 total yards.

"The defense was flying around," linebacker Mariano Sori-Marin said. "We really cleaned up our details this week, and that was the point of emphasis."

YOU MIGHT HAVE MISSED

RB injury: Running back Treyson Potts scored his first career touchdown to open the game Saturday but was carted off the sideline in the second quarter. He appeared back with his team in the fourth quarter with his right foot in a boot. Potts had rushed three times for 49 yards, including a 36-yard gain and his 9-yard score. Fellow redshirt freshman Cam Wiley assumed the No. 2 role, finishing the game with 57 yards on nine carries, including a 17-yard rush. Other absences: tight end Ko Kieft did not play for the second consecutive game, defensive tackle Keonte Schad missed for undisclosed reasons and defensive coordinator Joe Rossi did not call the game after testing positive for COVID-19.

Defense still improving: While the defensive unit was much improved from previous games, it still showed signs of weakness. Illinois has one of the worst offenses in the Big Ten and didn't prove much of a threat in the air or on the ground. But some Gophers still missed plays, such as cornerback Benjamin St-Juste not being able to bring down an easy interception and Sori-Marin losing a one-on-one battle at the goal line to give up a touchdown. So there is still individual strengthening to do for that unit.

Bateman returns: After Bateman's quiet start to the season, he looked like a shadow of last year's Big Ten Receiver of the Year. But he re-debuted at Illinois, scoring his first touchdown of the year and sparking the Gophers passing game early to help return the team to its familiar and threatening rhythm from a strong rush and pass. Pro Football Focus graded Bateman an 88.1, making him the top-ranked Power Five receiver of the week.

The skinny: Iowa delivered the Gophers their first loss last season, derailed what could have been a perfect record to earn a trip to the Rose Bowl or even the College Football Playoff. Instead, the Gophers dropped 23-19 in Iowa City, extending their losing streak in the series to five games. But the most recent Gophers win from 2014 was at home in Minneapolis, so the Gophers will be eager for rivalry revenge.

Just like the Gophers, the Hawkeyes are 1-2, having endured close losses at Purdue and against Northwestern before dropping Michigan State 49-7 on Saturday. Iowa's defense ranks third in the Big Ten, allowing an average of 315 yards and 17.3 points per game. Its offense is more toward the middle, averaging 386 yards per game.

Hawkeyes rusher Tyler Goodson has three touchdowns and 233 yards through three games. Quarterback Spencer Petras is 63-for-116 for 648 yards and a 2-to-3 touchdown-to-interception ratio. Defensively, linebacker Seth Benson ranks third in the conference averaging 10.5 tackles per game, though he did not play against Michigan State for undisclosed reasons. The team also played without star receiver Ihmir Smith-Marsette, arrested Nov. 1 for operating a vehicle while under the influence.

Tide, Irish are 1-2 after Clemson loss

NEWS SERVICES

Clemson freshman **D.J. Uiagalelei** filled in at quarterback for the second straight week after **Trevor Lawrence's** positive COVID-19 test. Lawrence traveled with the Tigers and was on the sideline Saturday. Uiagalelei threw for 439 yards and two touchdowns.

Clemson had won 36 consecutive regular-season games and had not lost an ACC game since 2017.

"They dadgum earned it," Swinney said. "We handle our business, maybe we'll get a chance to play again."

Notre Dame is a football member of the ACC for the 2020 season only as teams navigate the coronavirus pandemic. Most believe the Irish and Tigers will meet again for the conference crown Dec. 19.

Indiana cracks Top 10
Indiana is ranked in the Associated Press top 10 for the first time in 51 years.

The 10th-ranked Hoosiers improved to 3-0 after ending a 24-game losing streak to Michigan on Saturday.

Among other Big Ten teams, Ohio State is third, Wisconsin 13th and Northwestern 23rd. Michigan dropped out.

Northwestern is ranked for the first time since finishing the 2018 season at No. 21.

Etc.
Alabama extended its record of consecutive seasons with at least one week on top of the Associated Press poll to 13.

Air Force's game at Wyoming this week was canceled because of an "upward trend" of COVID-19 cases at the Air Force Academy.

The Pac-12 moved Utah's game at UCLA from Friday to Saturday. Utah has had a rise in positive COVID-19 cases. The Utes' opener against Arizona was canceled.

Saturday's game was played in front of a pandemic-reduced crowd of 11,011. At least a few thousand fans stormed the field afterward, making it hard for both teams to get to their respective locker rooms.
